

Objectives

- **Art History and Culture:** Introduce students to armadillos which are the state animal of Texas.
- **Artistic Perception:** To show students how composition and perspective can combine to create well rendered art.
- **Creative Expression:** Allow students to select the colors used.
- **Artistic Criticism:** Students will evaluate their own work using the four steps of art criticism.

KUDs

• Know:

- Students will know the fundamental principles of composition in art, understanding the concepts of foreground and background.
- Students will know the basic techniques for drawing with a pencil, including line work and stroke.

Understand:

- Students will understand how to create depth and perspective in their drawings by implementing foreground and background elements.

- Students will comprehend the step-by-step process of transitioning from pencil sketch to bold sharpie lines and finally to the addition of vibrant colors.

Do:

- Students will demonstrate proficiency in tracing their pencil drawings with a sharpie, emphasizing the desired lines.
- Students will apply coloring techniques using colored pencils to enhance and bring their artwork to life, considering shading and color harmony.

By the end of the lesson, students will have the knowledge, understanding, and skills to create a visually compelling artwork with a well-thought-out composition and refined craftsmanship.

Description of Instructional Procedures

Introduction:

- Discuss the importance of composition in art, emphasizing the role of foreground and background elements. Present examples of artworks that effectively use composition to create depth and visual interest.

Pencil Drawing:

- Guide students in sketching a composition that incorporates foreground and background elements.

Tracing with Sharpie:

Accommodations and Modifications

Educational Accommodations:

Extended Time:

- Allow students to use alternative tools for tracing, such as thicker markers or colored pencils, to make tracing lines more visible and manageable for those with fine motor challenges.

Collaborative Artwork:

- Implement a collaborative art project where students work in pairs or small groups, sharing responsibilities for drawing, tracing, and coloring. This promotes teamwork and provides additional support.

Coloring Assistance:

- Assign a peer buddy or provide additional support for students who may find coloring challenging. This assistance can include guidance on color choices, shading techniques, or even physical assistance if needed..
